



She explained. "In all my years of attending church socials and potluck dinners. REUNION 2001 – I am happy to report that the 47th, 48th, and 396th have all agreed to have their reunion at the Center of New Hampshire Holiday Inn in beautiful downtown Manchester. The room rate is set at \$92 plus 8% state tax... this is a bit high because of their "fall foliage" traffic. according to the 47th's Arnold Sayer, the coordinator of the reunion. CRUISE, ANYONE? – Many people have asked, "Why don't we have a cruise?" so I decided to pitch one and see what happens. I have talked this over with a few people that have said they would be very interested.

We have probably been on at least a dozen ships and the one above is the very most stunningly elegant of any. You are just constantly awestruck with the beauty of the naval architecture and the design of just everything aboard.
