Subject: TAPS

....We have all heard the haunting song, "Taps." It's the song that gives us that lump in our throats and usually creates tears in our eyes. But, do you know the story behind the song? If not, I think you will be pleased to find out about its humble beginnings.

Reportedly, it all began in 1862 during the Civil War, when Union Army Captain Robert Ellicombe was with his men near Harrison's Landing in Virginia. The Confederate Army was on the other side of the narrow strip of land. During the night, Captain Ellicombe heard the moans of a soldier who lay severely wounded on the field. Not knowing if it was a Union or a Confederate soldier, the Captain decided to risk his life and bring the stricken man back for medical attention. Crawling on his stomach through the gunfire, the Captain reached the stricken soldier and began pulling him toward his encampment.

When the Captain finally reached his own lines, he discovered it was actually a Confederate soldier, but the soldier was dead. The Captain lit a lantern and suddenly caught his breath and went numb with shock. In the dim light, he saw the face of the soldier. It was his own son. The boy had been studying music in the South when the war broke out. Without telling his father, the boy enlisted in the Confederate Army.

The following morning, heartbroken, the father asked permission of his superiors to give his son a full military burial despite his enemy status. His request was only partially granted The Captain had asked if he could have a group of Army band members play a funeral dirge for his son at the funeral The request was turned down since the soldier was a Confederate But out of

respect for the father, they did say they could give him only one musician. The Captain chose a bugler. He asked the bugler to play a series of musical notes he had found on a piece of paper in the pocket of the dead youth's uniform. This wish was granted. The haunting melody we now know as "Taps," used at military funerals, was born....

I have felt the chills while listening to "Taps" but I have never seen all the words to the song until now. I didn't even know there was more than one verse. I also never knew the story behind the song and I didn't know if you had so I thought I'd pass it along. I now have an even deeper respect for the song that I did before.

Yesterday, the Pacific Northwest had a 6.8 earthquake. It was centered about 100 miles north of Portland.

I was in a doctor's office at the time, and I only felt a slight motion, but I knew we going through an earthquake.

Beverly was home and talking to Kem Sitterley on the phone. The kitchen floor began to shake, the cupboard doors swung open, dishes rattled, and mortar fell loose from inside the chimney. God is in charge. (Editor's note...see end of page for my story of the phone call.)

I am still working in my forest. At the present time I am in the process of planting 1200 Western Red Cedars. These seedlings are two years old and are about 15 inches long with roots 8 inches long.

The Pacific Northwest is experiencing a low rainfall. We are only getting one half of our normal amount of rain. This means a greater forest fire potential; not enough water for the Salmon runs, shortage of our drinking water, and restricted water for electric power generation. Our water is stored in snow packs in the mountains for spring and summer run offs. (Editor's note.... Crazy weather... just a few days ago, I heard one of our local newscasters say something like, "Who would have thought it? Year to date Los Angeles has had more rain than Seattle, and Seattle has had more earthquakes than Los Angeles!")

The new year has started and I would like to remind you about our \$15.00 dues for 2001.

I have received two checks for 2001....Fitz Fitapatrick and John Helmer.

Our present balance in our savings account is \$1,666.80. We will soon make a down payment for our reunion in New Hampshire.




YOUR EDITOR'S STORY OF HIS NOW-FAMOUS CALL TO BEVERLY HELMER....







Many people have said that they are interested. The ones that are planning on going at the present time include Enid and Gus Anderson, 820th; Pat and Dick Sternberg, 396th; Carolyn Colvin and "Gutts" Gutting, 47th; Lefty Pfingst, 48th; Polly and Kem Sitterley, 47th; and their daughter, Kemary Crowder.

DATES OF THE CRUISE – Aug. 19 – 26, 2001.

ITINERARY - Vancourver, Hubbard Glacier, Skagway, Haines, Juneau, Ketchikan, Misty Fjords, Vancouver.

TRAVEL AGENCY - The Travel Company, 3351 El Camino Real, Suite 250, Atherton, CA 94027-3804. 1-800-367-6090...Dial Extension 317, which should get you Tara who has handled our situation. She has also been able to confirm that our whole party can go at my interline rate, which means that we get the airline employee discount, which normally is the best you can get. Our son is a captain with USAirways, which is what enables us to get his rate.

INSIDE CABIN PRICE - \$883.00 per person double occupancy plus \$185.05 port tax per person, for the first two persons in each stateroom. The 3rd and 4th persons in each stateroom are \$429.00 per person plus \$185.05 port tax per person. Make sure and tell Tara that you're with the 41st Bomb Group. This particular cabin has no outside window. You can get more luxurious accommodations... and I'm sure that our interline rate would apply. This rate is one of the lower ones and there are probably a few under and a few over. My experience with cruise ships is that there are about a dozen different price levels depending on view, location, space, etc.

DINNER SEATING - We are too late to get main seating, but I put us down for the waiting list. We took this identical cruise last year, when we were on the waiting list and did get the main seating... this is a completely different thing however with maybe a dozen or two people involved.

TICKET INSURANCE - \$99 per person. I personally bought this insurance mainly because of a history of heart problems starting with a heart attack in 1990.

DEPOSIT – The minimum deposit to hold your space is \$250 per person. Payment in full is required 60 days before sail date, which would be approximately June 19, 2001.

REFUND POLICY – Full return, no penalty with written cancellation 60 days, or more before sail date. There is a graduated scale from there down depending on how many days before sail date you cancel.

CAR STORAGE – For those of you who may want to drive you may make car storage arrangements with the cruise company.


THREE HOUR ROLLER COASTER RIDE -





Don passed away peacefully March 1, 2000 after a courageous three year battle with lymphoma cancer. Don graduated from U.S. Army Air Corps Officers Flying School as a 2nd Lt. With Silver Wings in 1943 at Santa Ana, CA. He took part in the first land based B-25 raid over

Tokyo. He was in the bomb raids on Southern Japan when the Atomic Bomb was dropped on Hiroshima.

Don served proudly for 27 years of active duty with the Air Force. He loved his country and served honorably, earning many decorations. He retired on May 1, 1967 after serving in World War II, the Korean Conflict and the Vietnam Era. He was assigned to B-25 Crews, B-29 Crews, and to a KC 135 Crew as his last flying duty, flying with the Strategic Air Command Headquarters at Offutt Air Force Base, Omaha, Nebraska.

Don married Eileen Purdue on August 31, 1943 in Greenville, South Carolina, and they spent 56 years together. Surviving are his wife, Eileen, one daughter, one son, and seven grandchildren.
